

# FLORIDA STATE COLLECTION OF ARTHROPODS

Introducing the Florida State Collection of Arthropods, or FSCA, Gainesville, Florida. The FSCA is home for our society and houses the official State insect collection of Florida. It is not restricted to Florida insects, however, but is a worldwide collection that has grown to over 6.9 million curated specimens, the 5th largest insect collection in the United States. Lepidoptera at the FSCA comprise over 1.3 million adult specimens, plus about 100,000 larvae in alcohol. The FSCA collection is strongest in Florida and the southeastern United States, the Neotropical fauna, and Taiwan, but has some material from all areas of the world. Many groups of insects are represented at the FSCA by the largest collections in the world. The Odonata collection, including material that is already willed to the FSCA, comprises the largest collection in the world of adults and larvae of this order of insects. The FSCA has 8 staff entomologists covering the main insect orders, including one specialist on spiders: our society Editor and Executive Director is in charge of the Lepidoptera at the FSCA.

The close proximity of the University of Florida (the FSCA is on the edge of the campus) provides excellent training opportunities for students wanting to specialize in Lepidoptera biology and taxonomy, or tropical studies such as in zoology, ecology, or agriculture, etc. Numerous faculty and adjunct faculty provide various expertise to train and guide undergraduate and graduate students.

The Florida Museum of Natural History (FMNH) is also on the University of Florida campus and manages the off-site Lepidoptera collections in Sarasota, at the Allyn Museum of Entomology. Plans call for eventually moving the Allyn Museum to Gainesville when the FMNH has sufficient space to house it locally. The Allyn Museum houses about 900,000 Lepidoptera specimens, with special strength in Neotropical butterflies, although the collection is truly worldwide in coverage.

# **ELECTIONS**

Many members sent in their ballots and demonstrated support for the two candidates for President and Vice President. Next election we will have a real choice! These mostly honorary positions will be held in 1992 by Dr. Claude Lemaire, as President, and Dr. Thomas C. Emmel, as Vice President. #### NOTES

# A LEPIDOPTERA EXPEDITION THROUGH MALAYSIA

From May 24 to June 8, 1991, the Holbrook lepidopterists' expedition to Malaysia brought the delights and lepidopterological treasures of that fascinating country to 20 avid lepidopterists. We left Los Angeles International Airport on a Malaysian airlines flight at midnight on the 24th, flying to Honolulu and Taipei en route to Kuala Lumpur. There we met our fantastic guide from our 1987 expedition, Chang Kam Wor, who soon whisked us off on a grand tour of Kuala Lumpur. Because May 26th had disappeared when we crossed the international dateline on the exhausting flight, we started collecting on the 27th in the Kuala Lumpur area. From then on, the collecting and photography got unbelievably better every day! A full report, illustrated with color photographs by John Noble, Helen and Wallace Mullaly, and Tom Emmel, is being prepared for publication in the Spring 1992 issue of Tropical Lepidoptera, but here we might mention a few highlights.

In the Cameron Highlands, at Kuala Woh Park, we saw great numbers of *Trogonoptera brookiana albescens* landing on hot sand where sulphur-bearing water was bubbling up and attracting them to drink. They also soared ponderously like giant prehistoric pterosaurs over the river here. Visiting steep mountain slopes, aboriginal villages and wild canyons daily, we found large numbers of *Troides* and other swallowtails, *Cethosia* and a wide variety of nymphalids, *Delias, Celastrina* blues, and some wonderful *Arophala* and *Bindehara* hairstreaks as well as the very unusual *Allotinus* dusky "blues" (subfamily Miletinae of the Lycaenidae). At Taiping, we stayed in guest houses high on Maxwell Hill at about 3,400-3,700' elevation. Diurnal collecting was terrific for such rarities as *Ideopsis* danaids and *Troides* species, as well as many satyrids. But the most unbelievable collecting was at night for the moths, including Atlas moths, *Actias selene*, 50 to 60 species of sphingids, etc. In fact, the moth collecting was so good that a number of our lepidopterists refused to come down for meals and sent for their meals to be brought up to them! Worn out by the superb collecting here, we ended our trip at Penang Hill on Penang Island, where both diurnal and nocturnal collecting were excellent, including several endemic subspecies still existing on this well-settled island.

When we left Malaysia for the long flight back to the United States, we vowed that it would not be long before we planned another expedition back here to enjoy the incredible human diversity and natural diversity of this fantastic Asian country.
